**INFORMATION PROVIDED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC
SAFETY REENTRY OFFICE**

Department of Public Safety:

The Hawaii state Department of Public Safety (PSD) oversees the state's jails and prisons as well as a sheriff's division that provides law enforcement at state facilities, including court houses and airports. The mission of PSD is to provide for the safety of the public and state facilities through law enforcement and correctional management.

The department's operating budget for fiscal year 2011 was \$232.4 million, with \$214.6 million from the state's general funds. It has about 2,200 employees and is made up of three divisions:

Administration: Handles everything from training and staff development, personnel management, management of the operating budget, and capital improvements program budget.

Corrections: Oversees the state's jails and prisons. Represents 85 percent of the department's annual operating costs.

Law Enforcement: Includes the sheriffs division and narcotics enforcement division.

The department oversees four (4) jails and three (3) prisons in Hawaii that imprison roughly 6,000 of the state's citizens. That includes approximately 1,500 prisoners in mainland facilities.

Jails: Hawaii Community Correctional Center, Kauai Community Correctional Center, Maui Community Correctional Center, and the Oahu Community Correctional Center.

Prisons: Halawa Correctional Facility, Waiawa Correctional Facility, and the Women's Community Correctional Center. All three prisons are located on the island of Oahu.

The department submits annual reports to the Hawaii Legislature on its various programs

About the Reentry Office:

The Reentry office is established within the Hawaii state Department of Public Safety. The Department's Reentry Works Special Project capitalizes on the synergy of reentry efforts initiated by the Department. In 2007, Act 8 established an offender reentry system to assist adult offenders in preparing for release and reintegration back to the community.

In 2009, Act 24 established the Reentry Commission to work with the Department of Public Safety in monitoring and reviewing the comprehensive offender reentry program. The purpose of this Act was to create the offender reentry office to oversee offender reentry, thereby restoring the purpose of the intake service centers to screen, evaluate, and classify admission of offenders.

In 2011, a request for approval to extend the Reentry Works Special Project was granted through June 30, 2013. Under the proposed enhancement, modifications were made to the initial reentry plan to reflect Justice Reinvestment Initiatives. The Reentry Works Special Project Enhancement proposes to use authorized, vacant Departmental positions to expand its existing reentry capacity and capability by developing and implementing a seamless and comprehensive approach to reducing recidivism, prison overcrowding, and associated costs in housing inmates on mainland facilities.

The planned enhancements would feature infusing evidence-based practices into case management and rehabilitation services for offenders; using risk-need-responsivity principles to guide the safe transition of offender's return to the community; targeting the specialized needs of offenders; and engaging the community in the Department's reentry initiative. Under the Department's plans for reentry, there is also an overarching need to use authorized staff positions to design, develop, and implement crime victim's assistance services; engender community support for the reentry initiative; and meet the increasing demands of the Justice Reinvestment Initiative.

In 2012, Act 76 established the offender reentry office within the Department of Public Safety to address the goals of Chapter 353H, a comprehensive offender reentry system, and reconstitutes the Reentry Commission with the added duty to ensure that the comprehensive offender reentry system is implemented as soon as practicable.

The Reentry initiative helps individuals make successful and permanent returns from incarceration. Thus, preparing incarcerated individuals for reintegration into the community through programs and services that reflect best practices and evidence-based results. Our goal is to provide offenders with greater opportunities to become successful while ensuring public safety and reducing recidivism.

Reentry Commission:

The Commission was convened in October of 2012 and consists of ten members. Three (3) members were selected by the Governor, of whom one would be a rehabilitated former inmate; three (3) members were selected by the President of the Senate; three (3) members were selected by the Speaker of the House; and the Reentry coordinator shall serve as an ex officio non-voting member. The Commission is to ensure that the comprehensive offender reentry system under 353H, is implemented as soon as practicable, and to provide programs and services that result in the release of inmates on parole when terms have been served, instead of delaying the release for lack of programs and services. In addition, the Commission would work with the Department of Public Safety in monitoring and reviewing the comprehensive reentry program, including facility educational and treatment programs, rehabilitative services, work furloughs, and the Hawaii Paroling Authority's oversight of parolees. The Commission may make recommendations where needed.

The Directory:

The creation of this directory was influenced by an Offender Workforce Development Specialist (OWDS) Training Initiative which promoted collaboration between criminal justice agencies and community organizations to increase positive offender employment outcomes. As a result of this training, participants acquired knowledge and skills required to deliver effective workforce development services. In addition to the training, specific workgroups were created to address barriers related to offender reentry. Hence, the workgroup that laid the groundwork for this directory is called, "Pacific Resource." This directory is one of many strategies that will assist individuals in making a successful transition from prison/jail to the community. The development of this directory would not have been possible without the partnerships from the following agencies: Hawaii State Legislature, Ho'omau Ke Ola, Lanakila Pacific, TJ Mahoney's, Salvation Army ATS, Hina Mauka, U.S. District Court Probation Services, University of Hawaii Practicum Programs, and the Department of Public Safety. Therefore, we would like to thank all those involved who worked tirelessly on this effort.

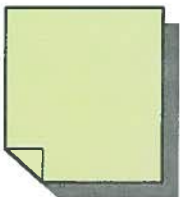

However, if the offense took place while you were enrolled in school and receiving federal financial aid, your eligibility will be suspended.

GET YOUR DRIVER’S LICENSE

Requirements for a driver’s license are available on the internet at <http://www1.honolulu.gov/csd/vehicle/dlicense.htm>

Every person who drives any type of motorized vehicle is required to be tested and licensed. A Hawaii Driver's License is also required for motor scooters and mopeds.

All the driver licensing stations (Kalihi- Palama, Wahiawa, Kapolei, Koolau, and Waianae, plus the Commercial Driver License office at 99-501 Salt Lake Blvd.) have a new statewide computer/camera licensing system. Satellite City Halls at Hawaii Kai, Pearlridge, and Windward City process renewals and duplicates only, using the computer/camera system.

Proof of "legal presence" is required for driver’s licenses and learner’s permits throughout Hawaii.

You should review traffic laws and rules of the road. You should study the Hawaii Driver's Manual prior to tests. Manuals are available at local bookstores and State libraries, or <http://hawaii.gov/dot/highways/hwy-v/> .

If you are under treatment for alcohol or substance abuse, you are required to have a medical clearance to obtain a driver's license.

State of Hawaii Birth, Death, Marriage or Divorce Certificate

- Download requests for certified copies of birth, death, marriage, and divorce certificates at www.ehawaii.gov/doh/vitrec/exe/vitrec.cgi, or fill out request forms in person in the Vital Records office at the Department of Health.
 - Days: Monday through Friday (excluding holidays and furloughs days)
 - Hours: 7:45 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.
 - Location: Room 103 (1st floor), 1250 Punchbowl St., Kinau Hale
TheBus stop is on Beretania Street in front of Kinau Hale.
If you are driving, enter the parking lot from Punchbowl Street. The meter takes quarters only.
- Online orders of certified copies will be mailed via first-class postal mail; they WILL NOT be issued online as part of your transaction.
- Fees for certified copies of birth death, marriage, and divorce certificates are identical. Payment is only by cash, or money order, certified check, or cashier's check, *made payable to the State Dept. of Health*. **No personal check will be accepted.** Payment for online orders must be made at the time the order is placed. Online order payments are only by a charge on a valid MasterCard, VISA, American Express, or Discover Card credit card.
 - \$10.00 for the first copy of each certificate;
 - \$11.50 for an online order requesting one (1) certified copy;
 - \$4.00 for each additional copy of the same certificate ordered at the same time (including online orders);
 - For online orders, a \$0.25 electronic processing fee is added to each additional copy of the same certificate.

What to bring: You must show a valid government-issued photo ID, such as State ID, driver's license, etc. Fill out your application form, then wait in line at the service counter. If you do not have an ID, notify the staff that you have been formerly incarcerated, and they will direct you on your options.

U.S. Mainland Birth, Death, Marriage or Divorce Certificate

- Search the government website of the state where the event occurred and go to its vital records link. Follow their instructions to obtain pertinent documents.

International Birth, Death, Marriage or Divorce Certificate

- Contact the nearest consulate of the country where the event occurred. They will guide you on the procedure to obtain the pertinent documents that you need.
- Caution: this process tends to be lengthy and can take as long as six months.

Your judgment or Sentencing Document has the Criminal Record numbers and amounts owed for restitution and other fees. You must know your Criminal Record Number to open a case at the CVCC and begin to make payments. They must be paid in this order:

1. Restitution, pay to CVCC and/or Court of Jurisdiction
2. Crime victim compensation fee (*pay to respective court*)
3. Probation services fee (*pay to Circuit/District/Family Court*)
4. Court fees (*pay to Circuit/District/Family Court—pre-sentence reports, DNA assessments, filing, etc*)
5. Fines (*pay to Circuit/District/Family Court*)

CHILD SUPPORT PAYMENTS

Contact the Child Support Enforcement Agency (CSEA), 692-8265 (24 hours a day), or visit their website at www.hawaii.gov/ag/csea. To get access to your account or to make payments, you need to have your assigned PIN and Access Code numbers. If you do not have these, write a letter to CSEA requesting these. THE COURT SYSTEM

Appellate Courts *Hawaii Supreme Court and Intermediate Court of Appeals*
Decides cases on appeal from trial courts

Trial Courts *Circuit, Family and District Courts* - Decides cases

The trial courts are divided into four (4) judicial districts (circuits):

- First Circuit—*Oahu and all other islands not in another circuit.*
- Second Circuit—*Mauai, Molokai, Lanai, Kahoolawe, and Molokini*
- Third Circuit—*Hawaii (Big Island)*
- Fifth Circuit—*Kauai and Niihau*

(The Fourth Circuit was eliminated in 1943 & merged into the Third Circuit.)

Circuit Courts

- Jury trial cases (civil and criminal)
- Probate, guardianship and criminal felony cases
- Civil cases where the contested amount is more than \$20,000
- Shared jurisdiction with Districts Courts in non-jury civil cases where the contested amount is between \$10,000 - \$20,000

Family Courts

- Legal matters involving children (delinquency, waiver, status offenses, abuse and neglect, parental rights, adoption, guardianships)
- Domestic relations cases (divorce, support, paternity, custody)

District Courts

- Traffic infractions, landlord-tenant disputes and restraining orders
- Non-jury trial civil cases where the contested amount is under \$10,000
- Civil cases where the claim is under \$20,000
- Criminal offenses punishable by fine or imprisonment less than 1 year

CRIMINAL RECORDS

The public has access to criminal history records through the Hawaii Criminal Justice Data Center (HCJDC) and the statewide criminal history record information system (CJIS-Hawaii). The Criminal History Records Check is commonly referred to as a "rap sheet" or "police abstract."

Available to the public: *Arrest records which have resulted in adult convictions (found guilty), or acquittals or dismissals by reason of physical or mental disease, disorder or defect*

Not available to the public: *Non-convictions that are still pending. You have the right to access your own record and to challenge the completeness and accuracy of the information. This is done through a fingerprint check.*

TRAFFIC ABSTRACTS

Traffic abstracts are available from the **District Court** in your circuit. They are usually needed for insurance, employment, etc. Most traffic violations remain on your record for 10 years, but some violations stay on longer.

In person Go to the District Court in your area. Be prepared to provide this information and \$7 fee in cash, money order or cashier's check per abstract:

- The individual's full name - Date of birth and driver's license number
- Release form, if the individual is a minor

Here are a few tips to increase your chances of getting assistance & some places with internet access:

- **Get & organize your vital documents.** Keep them in an easy-to-find place. Most programs require documents that prove your name, address, income, and other information. Call ahead to find out what documents you need to bring.
- **Call ahead to find out the program eligibility requirements.**
- **Be polite on the telephone and in-person.** Greet the person, introduce yourself, state your request, take notes, ask questions if you need clarification, and thank them when done. Dress appropriately when you go to your appointment for assistance.
- **Maintain communication.** Follow through with your appointments. Inform the service provider if your circumstances or contact information changed.
- **Be professional and stay calm.** If you feel you have been mistreated or are not getting the appropriate help, stay calm, and ask to speak to someone who has the authority to help you.
